

Multi fold project notes

There is an easy & a more difficult way to achieve this effect & I thought you would prefer the first as opposed to the partial die cutting method!

This really is a beautifully easy card fold to achieve, particularly as I have worked out the measurements for you! It does fold to fit into an envelope, just not in the usual way.

What you will need to recreate this project:

A4 card (29.7 x 21cm) - base colour
Contrast card or embellishment for focal point
Embellishments to decorate



Step by step:

Cut 6.2cm from the width of the card creating a piece 14.8 x 29.7cm & then turn the card & cut a slither off the width to measure 29.5cm.

With the card in horizontal position score lines top to bottom at 6.1: 12.2: 17.3 & 23.4cm, fold & burnish the central two lines back on themselves (mountain fold) & the outer two lines toward you (valley fold) to create the dramatic folded effect.

In the sample I used dies to create the central panel, but you could use whatever you have to hand, maybe an image or topper. The dies I used an unbranded set & I combining some coordinating satin foil card - which is a close match to the fancy foil card that I used on the outer panels - layered with more of the ivory card that I used for the base, & am quite pleased with the overall effect.

You can reduce the depth of the front aspect quite easily which will give you larger back panels, or a larger front aspect, play around with the concept to achieve even more dramatic effects.
